CDOT is pleased to announce that the Transportation Commission approved the continuation of the Safe Routes to School (SRTS) program by committing to fund the program with \$2 million for infrastructure projects and \$0.5 million for non-infrastructure projects annually, beginning in FY 2016.

Applications for the CDOT 2016 SRTS Infrastructure and Non-Infrastructure grants will be available by October 1<sup>st</sup>. An announcement will be sent out via email and will be available online at [www.codot.gov/programs/bikeped/safe-routes/resources](http://www.codot.gov/programs/bikeped/safe-routes/resources). Applications will be due Friday, January 8<sup>th</sup>. To provide guidance on completing the application and understanding the requirements of a CDOT grant, the Colorado Safe Routes to School program manager will be hosting grantee training sessions throughout the state. Let us know if someone in your community would like to host one.

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The Safe Routes to School (SRTS) program was established in Colorado in 2004 to distribute federal funds to eligible projects that enable and encourage children in Kindergarten through 8<sup>th</sup> grade to safely bicycle and walk to and from school. Successful SRTS programs are designed around the 5 Es - engineering, education, encouragement, enforcement, and evaluation - to achieve the greatest gains. SRTS equitably supports the diverse transportation needs of Colorado youth at all abilities, income levels, races and national origins and in rural, suburban, and urban communities. The programs contribute to Colorado's quality of life through healthier lifestyles, expanded commuting options, and easier access to schools and neighborhoods.

Eligible activities include but are not limited to:

- Planning, design, and construction of safe school routes for children to walk and bike to and from school
- Planning, design, and construction of facilities for pedestrians and bicyclists to travel to and from school
- Educating children, parents, and communities about safe walking and bicycling practices and the health benefits that result from walking and bicycling to and from school
- Funds are awarded through a statewide competitive process for construction and education projects chosen by an appointed advisory committee. \$2.0M is committed to fund infrastructure projects and \$0.5M for non-infrastructure projects.

### 2015-2016 Non-Motorized Recreational Trails Grants

The mission of CPW's Trails Program is to be the major facilitator in accomplishing the following visions for trails in Colorado through promoting understanding and stewardship of Colorado's outdoors by providing opportunities for the public use and support of Colorado's diverse system of trails.

- Colorado's trail system will allow Coloradans to experience the state's diverse landscapes in a range of ways.
- Trails are developed with sensitivity to the environment and in ways they complement other lands (e.g., people can use trails to commute to work or school or get other places they want to go).
- Trails are well maintained.
- Conflict among trail users and impacts to trail settings are minimized through design, management, and education.
- The public has access to maps and other information they need to find the trail experiences they seek.
- The system is a collaborative effort among public and private entities, with the State Trails Program providing leadership in accomplishing this vision.
