

Local Governing Body-Boards and Commissions Approved Variance to Colorado Public Health Order 20-28- June 11, 2020

Variance

The state of Colorado has issued a variance approval to Public Health Order 20-28. This variance approval is in effect until the final expiration of the PHO 20-28. Local government boards and commissions may operate under the following guidelines:

- Local government boards and commissions have been authorized to function as a critical government function under the Safer at Home orders.
- In order to achieve 6ft social distancing, the limit is 50% of the posted occupancy code limit ensuring a minimum of 28 square feet per person not to exceed more than 100 people at any given time in a single indoor confined space.
- Maintain at least 6 ft. social distancing between all guests
- Require all guests to sign in with contact information. Local government authority should maintain this list for a minimum of 30 days.
- Increase cleaning of high-touch surfaces between meetings
- Make hand sanitizer available at the entrance to the facility
- Restrict gatherings/socializing activities within the building and disperse crowds if they form
- All visitors and board or commission members should be screened for symptoms before entering the facility. Anyone who is symptomatic must be excluded.
- All visitors and board or commission members must wear a cloth mask or face covering.
- Employees who are symptomatic must be excluded from the workplace and required to isolate according to current CDC guidelines (currently 10 days). They should be encouraged to get tested for COVID-19 either through a local provider or community-wide testing site.
- In all other respects, the requirements of the Safer at Home Public Health Order 20-28, as amended, remain in effect for Pueblo County.

Note: If the current public health order or subsequent amendments to that order should change in which more restrictions are lifted, government boards and commissions may immediately begin to modify their operations to be in compliance with the most recent public health order.

Outbreaks


Pueblo County has identified the following specific data triggers related to outbreaks connected to government boards or commissions:

- If two or more staff or visitors who test positive within 14 days and the outbreak is determined to be connected or possibly connected to their attendance or to a government board or commission meeting, the boards or commissions must return to the requirements of the current State public health order unless the following action is taken:
 - o Close the facility to the public for 72 hours,
 - Deep clean facilities,
 - o Notify community of outbreak,
 - Provide visitor and staff list to public health for case investigation and contact tracing.

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- o Work with the Pueblo Department of Public Health and Environment regarding plans to reopen.
- If multiple outbreaks occur related to participating in a government board or commission; return to the requirements of the current State public health order unless the following action is taken:
 - Close facility for 7 days
 - o Deep clean common areas and facilities
 - Notify the community of the outbreaks
 - o Provide visitor and staff list to public health for case investigation and contact tracing
 - Work with the Pueblo Department of Public Health and Environment regarding plans to reopen.

Variance Alteration and Rescission

- If Pueblo County reports more than 84 new COVID-19 cases in a two-week period (2-week incidence of 51 per 100,000) has occurred, the Pueblo Department of Public Health will initiate the following alteration process:
 - Implement a mitigation plan for 2 weeks to try to restore virus transmission levels to baseline under which the variance was approved.
 - If after 2 weeks the levels are not restored, then the capacity limits are automatically adjusted to reflect the CDPHE guidelines.
- The Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment and the Pueblo Department of Public Health and Environment reserve the right to modify or rescind this variance approval as circumstances warrant.
